Providing the right skills for growth

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The wider economic context

The recovery is well underway: QES Q4 2013

- Following a strong business performance in Q3, Q4 saw consolidated growth.
- Business confidence in both profitability and turnover over the next 12 months has remained high
 - a net 54 per cent of respondents expect profits to rise over the following year
 - a net 65 per cent predict an increase in turnover.
- As employers start to take on more staff, ensuring we are producing a workforce to meet the needs of business is of critical importance. This issue is being explored further in Q1 2014.



What does this mean for employment?

In Q1 2014 (survey still ongoing):

- 30% increased workforce of past 3 months (9% decreased)
- 75% of the above figure was due to business growth
- 77% of new positions created were full-time
- 34% expect the workforce to increase further over coming quarter

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Are the right skills there?

- 31% report access to skilled labour as a greater concern than 3 months ago
- Of businesses recruiting last quarter, 51% had difficulty finding someone with the suitable skills
 - 35% said it was for skilled manual/technical roles
 - 42% for professional/managerial roles
 - 8% clerical roles
 - 14% unskilled/semi-skilled roles

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Business response

Working with schools

- 34% engage with schools (13% don't currently but want to)

Apprenticeships

37% of respondents employ apprentices (12% don't currently but want to)

Training

- 34% have revised their training budgets upwards over the last quarter

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Barriers to training

- No provision (14% of survey respondents)
- Unaware of provision (10%)
- Too costly (40%)
- Provision not flexible (13%)
- No provision locally (13%)
- Too much jargon (2%)
- No technical expertise (8%)
- Lack of technical training facilities (4%)
- No barriers (25%)



Examples of what the Chamber is doing

- Young people need to be enthused about the range of opportunities in the region. Links between business and schools/colleges are a major focus for the Chamber, which includes delivering a successful Schools Forum
- The Chamber Budget Submission put skills and employment at the centre of its asks, focusing on apprenticeship funding, the New Enterprise Allowance and building better links between schools and business.
