PERFORMANCE MANAGEMENT – DISCUSSION DOCUMENT

1 Outcomes from the discussion

The Board is invited to determine its preferred approach to monitoring and managing performance across the cultural sector. In particular, to

- Agree the proposed basket of indicators to form the basis of six-monthly reports to the Derbyshire Partnership Forum
- Identify what other indicators, if any, it would wish to see incorporated into the Cultural Strategy which is in preparation
- Select those venues and activities which will be used to supply sample data and agree to contribute data as appropriate

2 Background

As part of the former Local Area Agreement, the Culture Board was required to monitor progress on three national indicators:

- Use of libraries
- Adult participation in sport and active recreation
- A thriving third sector

To support the Board in this work, a basket of indicators was agreed for libraries and sport, and an action plan for the voluntary and community sector. These were the subject of regular reports to the Culture Board.

National indicators have been abolished, along with the assessment regime which was led by the Audit Commission. Local authorities are now required to establish their own arrangements for self-assessment, including where appropriate the use of peer reviewers from other councils.

The Derbyshire Partnership Forum, to which Culture Derbyshire is responsible, is developing a performance reporting mechanism which will include a report to the full partnership at six monthly intervals, in June and December. The precise details are still under development but, following officer discussions, a small number of indicators has been proposed for each Board. These could, if required, form the basis for Culture Derbyshire's overview of the sector's performance.

At the same time, work is beginning on the three-year collaborative doctoral project with the University of Sheffield, which will deliver a methodology for evaluating impact and outcomes, and hard evidence of the difference which cultural services are making to the lives of Derbyshire people.

3 Principles

The Board's primary responsibilities are to

- provide strategic direction for cultural services within the Derbyshire Sustainable Community Strategy;
- take wider responsibility for championing, co-ordinating and developing cultural provision across Derbyshire.

In fulfilling this strategic role, the Board will need to be furnished with high level information which helps it identify what is working well and where there is scope for improvement. It will not want to be bogged down with large amounts of data at an operational level, which may nevertheless be useful in managing specific areas of service.

In principle, therefore, the indicators which the Board selects should be

- Consistent and capable of comparison over time
- Describe the broad direction of travel for cultural services
- Be already available, or capable of collection without undue difficulty
- Provide meaningful data through sampling where necessary
- Help to demonstrate progress against the Cultural Strategy
- Reflect the three key areas of
 - Participation
 - Value for money
 - Quality of life

4 Sources of data

With the changes to national evaluation regime referred to above, sources of qualitative data are limited. These are primarily

The Derbyshire Citizens' Panel (bi-annual)

The Derbyshire Residents' Survey (biennial)

Active People (annual)

Public Library User Survey (triennial)

It is therefore likely that most of the data will have to be aggregated from the in-house systems of partners. It would be unrealistic to attempt comprehensive data

collection from all parts of the cultural sector, and so it will be necessary to agree a sample of datasets.

The collaborative doctoral project also will assist in identifying a methodology for measuring value for money and quality of life outcomes.

5 Indicators

A number of indicators are listed in the attached table. The most relevant are those which have been identified to form the basis of six-monthly reports to the Derbyshire Partnership Forum. The table shows where further development is needed: for example, where it is not realistic to attempt comprehensive coverage, and so a data sample needs to be identified.

The second column lists those priority areas which the Board agreed at its first meeting in September 2011. It is unlikely that many of these could be measured in a consistent way.

The third and fourth columns list a selection of the indicators which the Culture Board used to monitor progress against the national indicators for which it was responsible. Most of these are too detailed or operational for the current purpose, but may help stimulate discussion.
