

# Priority 1: Improve Health and wellbeing in early years

Every child fit to learn and attain the highest levels of literacy

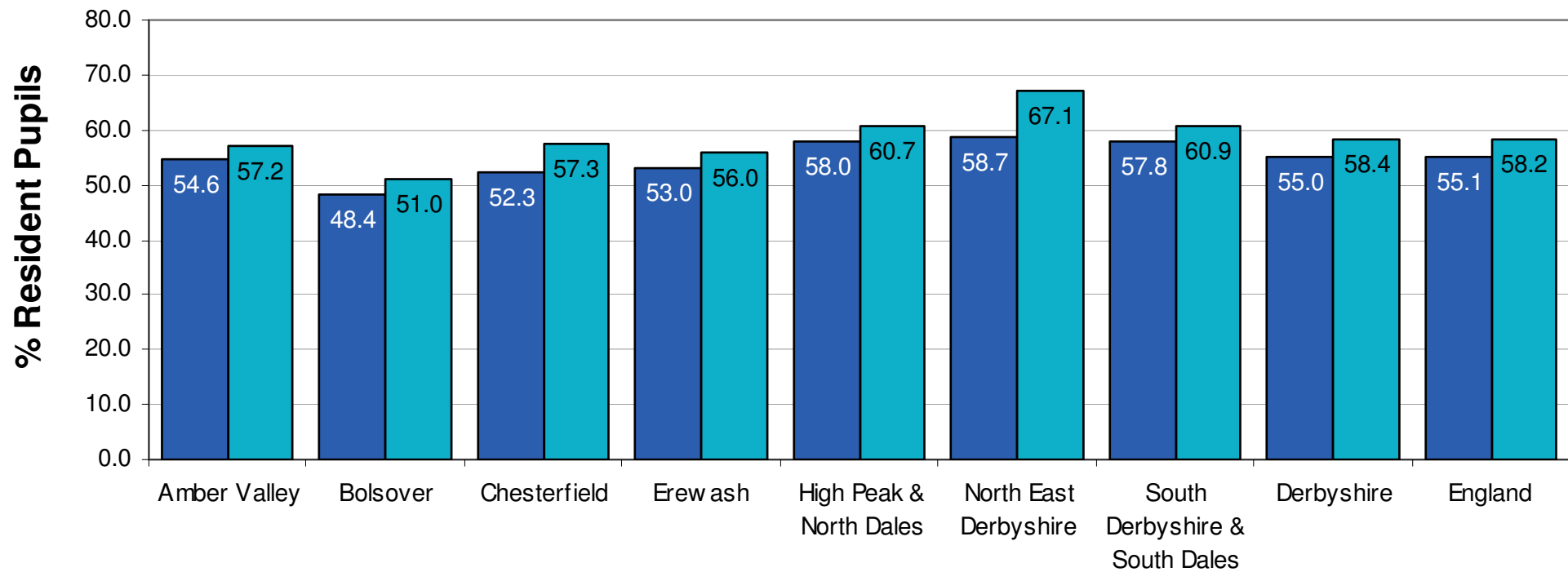
**Focus on early intervention and identification of vulnerable children and families (including children with disabilities)**

- North East Derbyshire had the largest increase in achievement by 8.4% points in 2010/11 and has the highest rate at 67.1%

- Derbyshire has increased achievement rates by 3.4 percentage points and remains similar to the England average

- Bolsover has the lowest rate of resident pupils achieving 5 or more A\*-C GCSEs including English and Maths, however this has increased by 2.6 % points since 2010

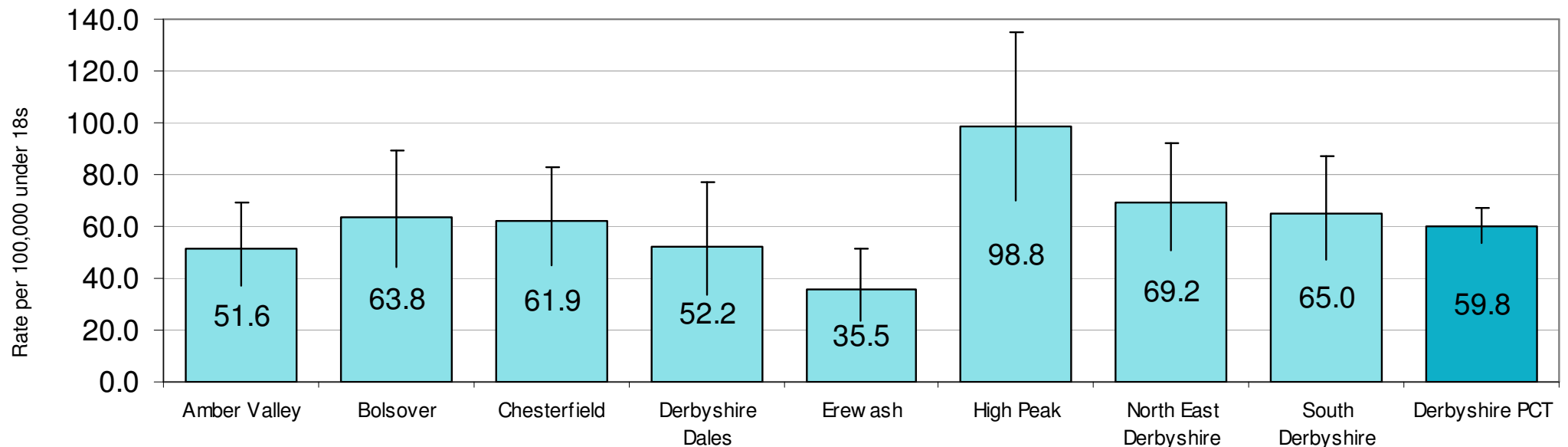

- Erewash has a significantly lower rate of hospital admissions amongst under 18s than Derbyshire

- High Peak has the highest rate of hospital admissions at 98.8 per 100,000 under 18s, which is 39.0 per 100,000 higher than the Derbyshire average

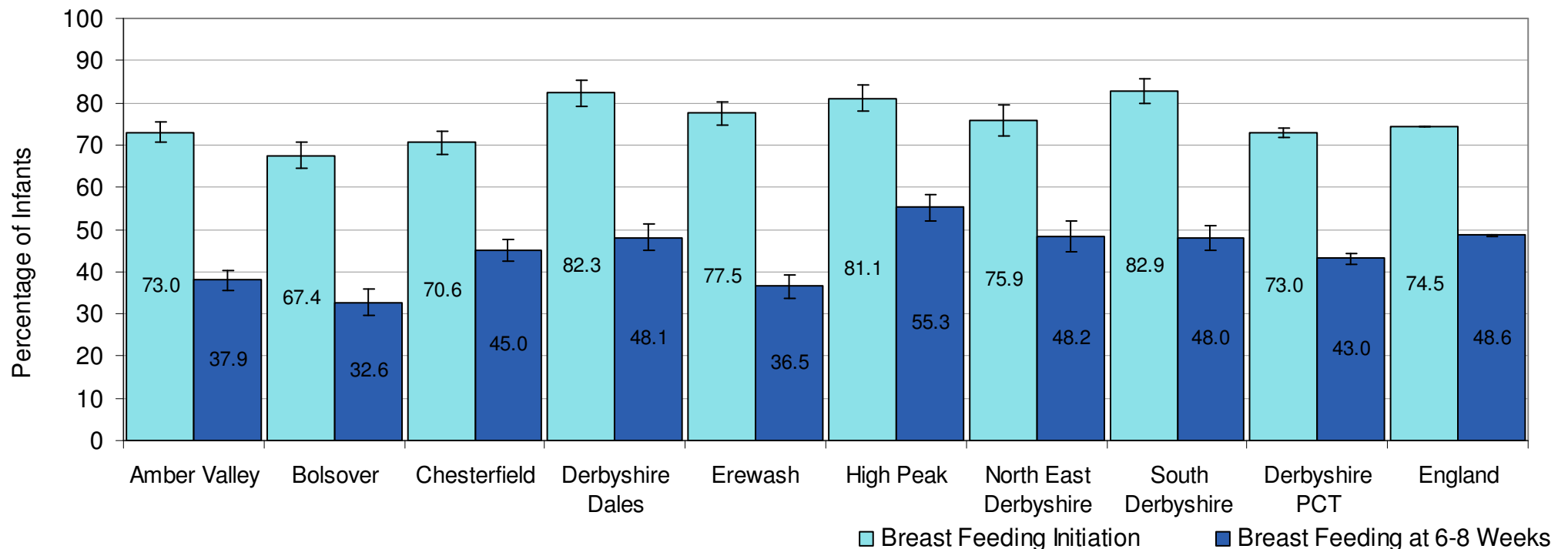
- The rate of breastfeeding initiation and breastfeeding at 6-8 weeks in Derbyshire are both below the England average

- South Derbyshire (82.9%), Derbyshire Dales (82.3%) and High Peak (81.3%) have the highest rate of breastfeeding initiation in the county, whilst Bolsover has the lowest (67.4%)

- High Peak has the highest rate of infants still being breast fed at 6-8 weeks (55.3%), which is well above the England rate of 48.6%

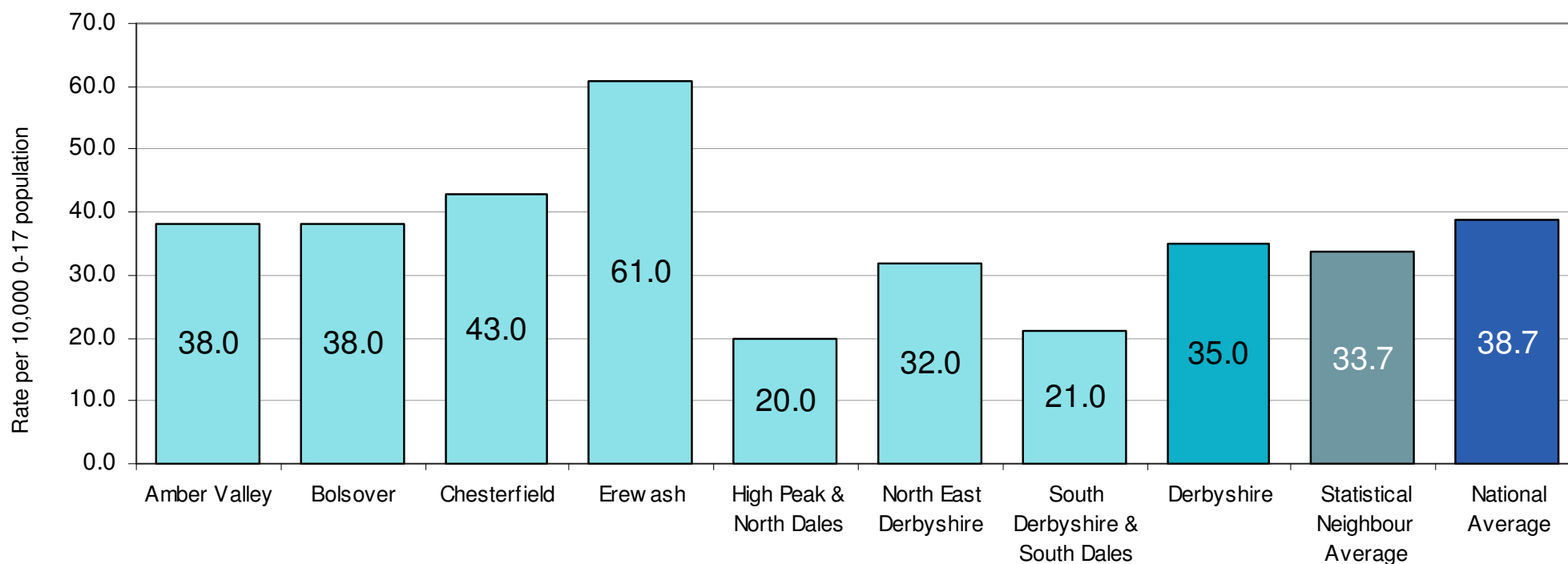
- High Peak & North Dales (20.0) and South Derbyshire & South Dales (21.0) has the lowest number of children with a child protection plan in 2010/11

- Erewash, at 61.0 child protection plans per 10,000 under 18s population has a significantly higher rate amongst Derbyshire's CAYA areas.

- Derbyshire (35.0) has fewer Child Protections plans than England 38.7
- 13.0 per 10,000 0-17 yr olds in Derbyshire with a Child Protection plan are disabled

## Number of Children Subject to a Child Protection Plan

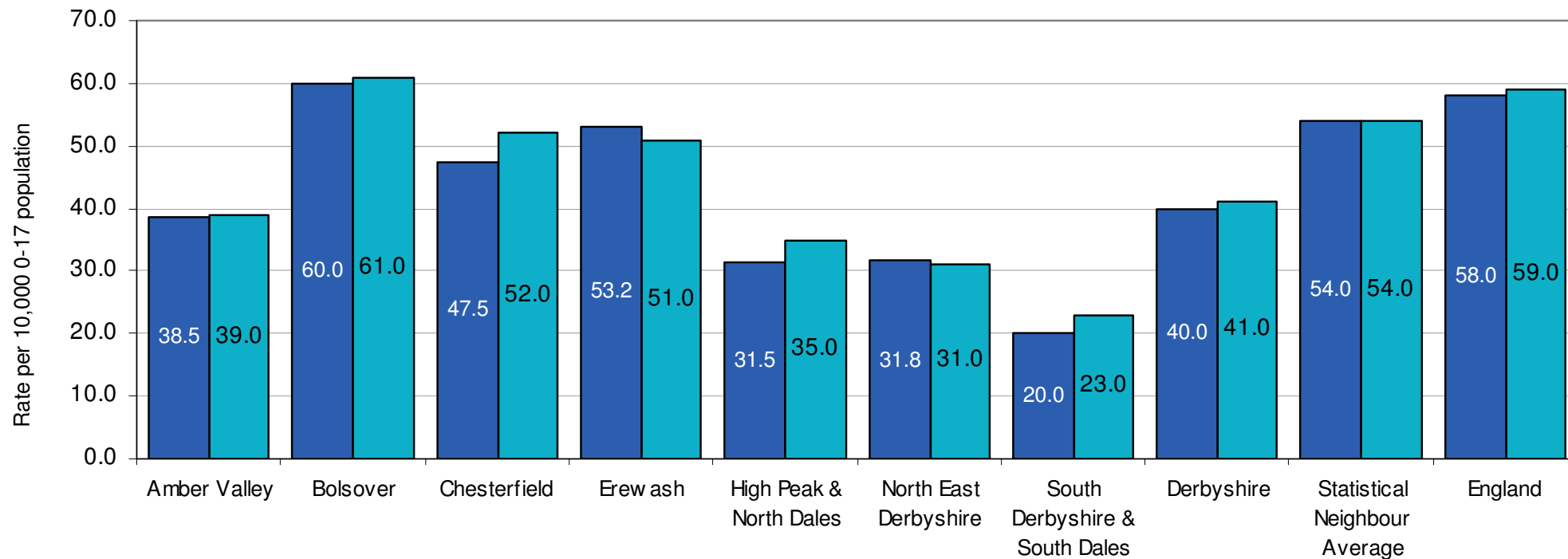
per 10,000 population aged under 18 years, 2010/11

per 10,000 population aged under 18 years, 2009/10 to 2010/11



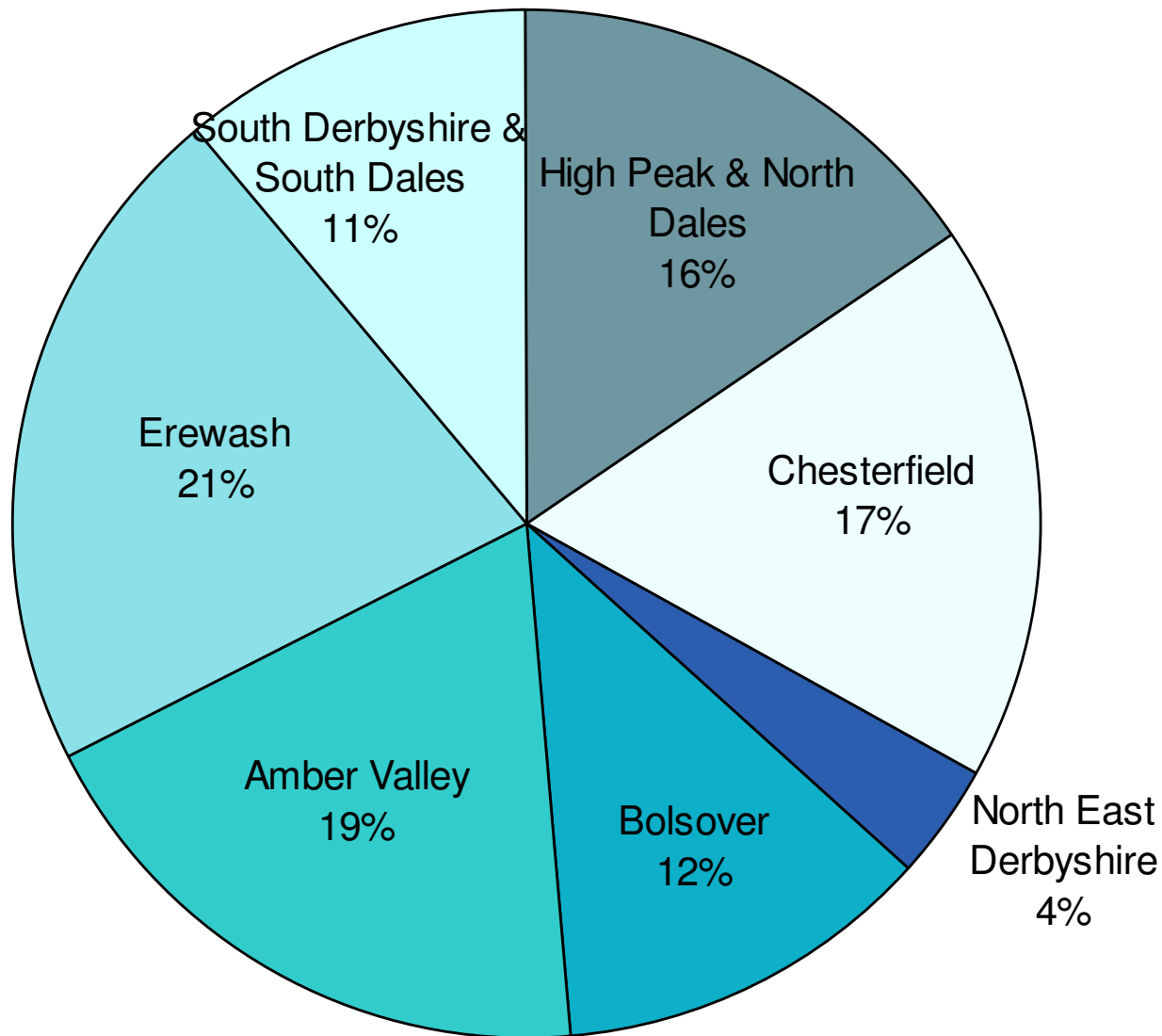

- Derbyshire (41.0) has significantly fewer Children in care per 10,000 of 0-17 population than England (59.0)
- Chesterfield has had the largest increase in the rate of children in care since 2009/10
- Erewash and North East Derbyshire have both seen a decline in their rates
- 94.0 children per 10,000 looked after children are disabled

# Number of Referrals Received Regarding Domestic Violence Where Children are Part of the Family Unit,

- Derbyshire had 1,560 referrals in 2011/12

- Erewash has the most referrals regarding domestic violence 21%

- 5 referrals were from families with disabled children

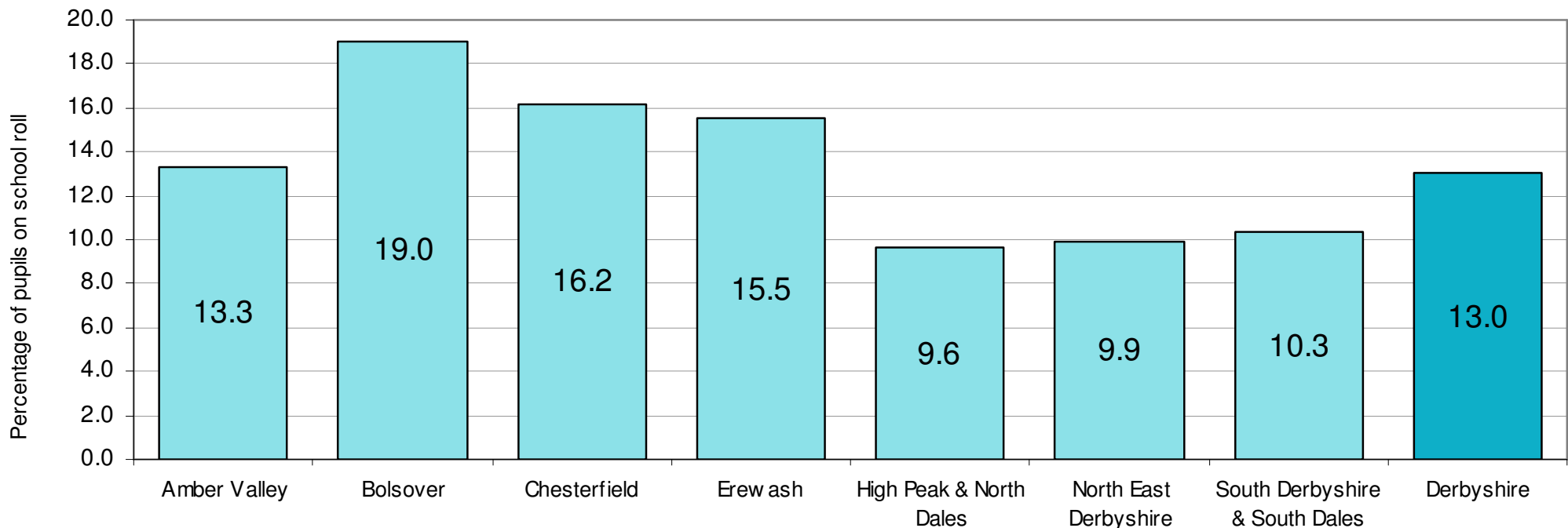

- Bolsover has the highest percentage of pupils eligible for free school meals at 19.0%

- In both High Peak & North Dales and North East Derbyshire less than 10% of pupils are eligible for free school meals

School Census October 2011 at School CAYA District

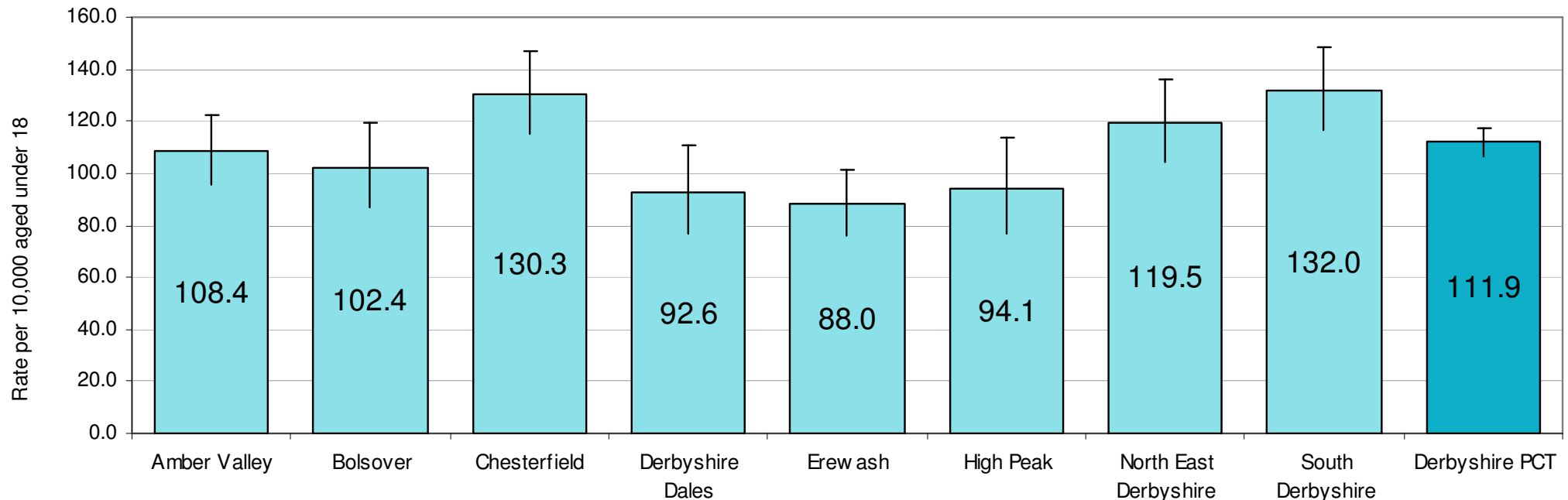

- Erewash (88.0) has the lowest rate per 10,000 0-17 year olds with both unintentional and deliberate injuries in 2010/11

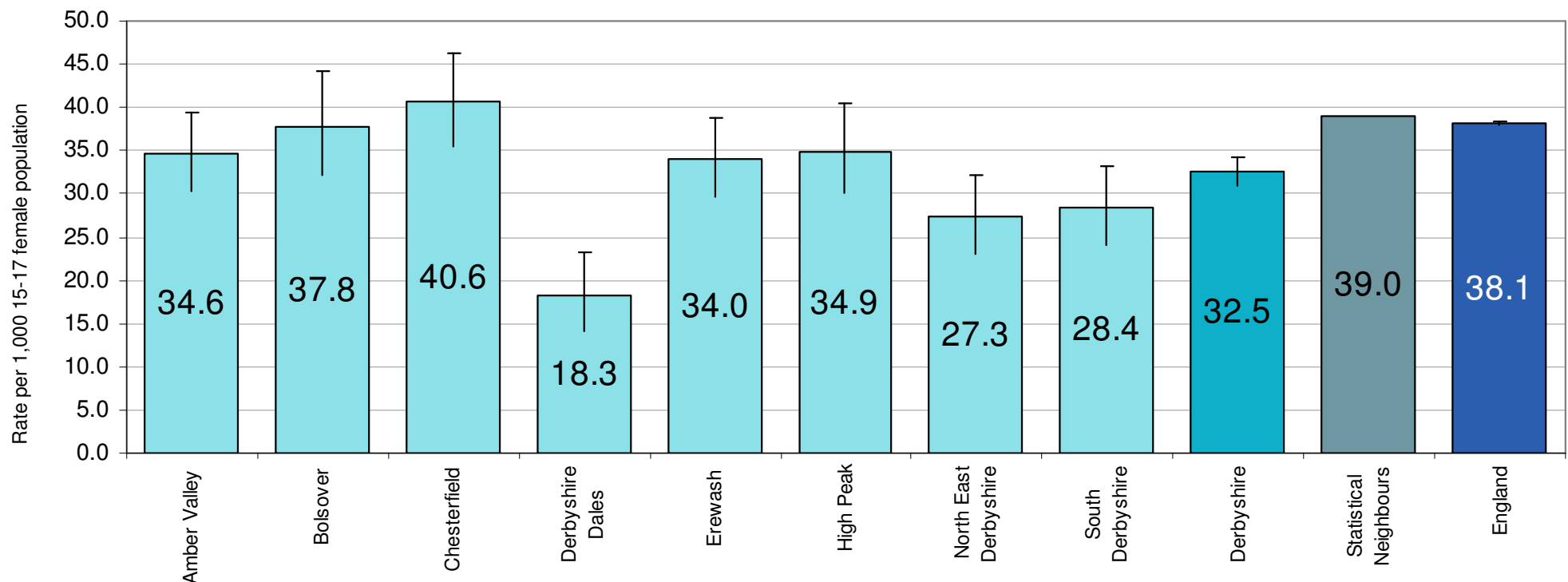
- South Derbyshire has the highest rate of emergency hospital admissions in 2010/11 with 132.0 admissions per 10,000 0-17 years olds

- The under 18 conception rate in Derbyshire (32.5) is much lower than that for England (38.1) and its statistical neighbours, at 39.0 per 1,000 16-17 year olds

- Derbyshire Dales has the lowest conception rate amongst females aged 15-17 years at 18.3 conceptions per 1,000 population, whilst Chesterfield has the highest (40.6)

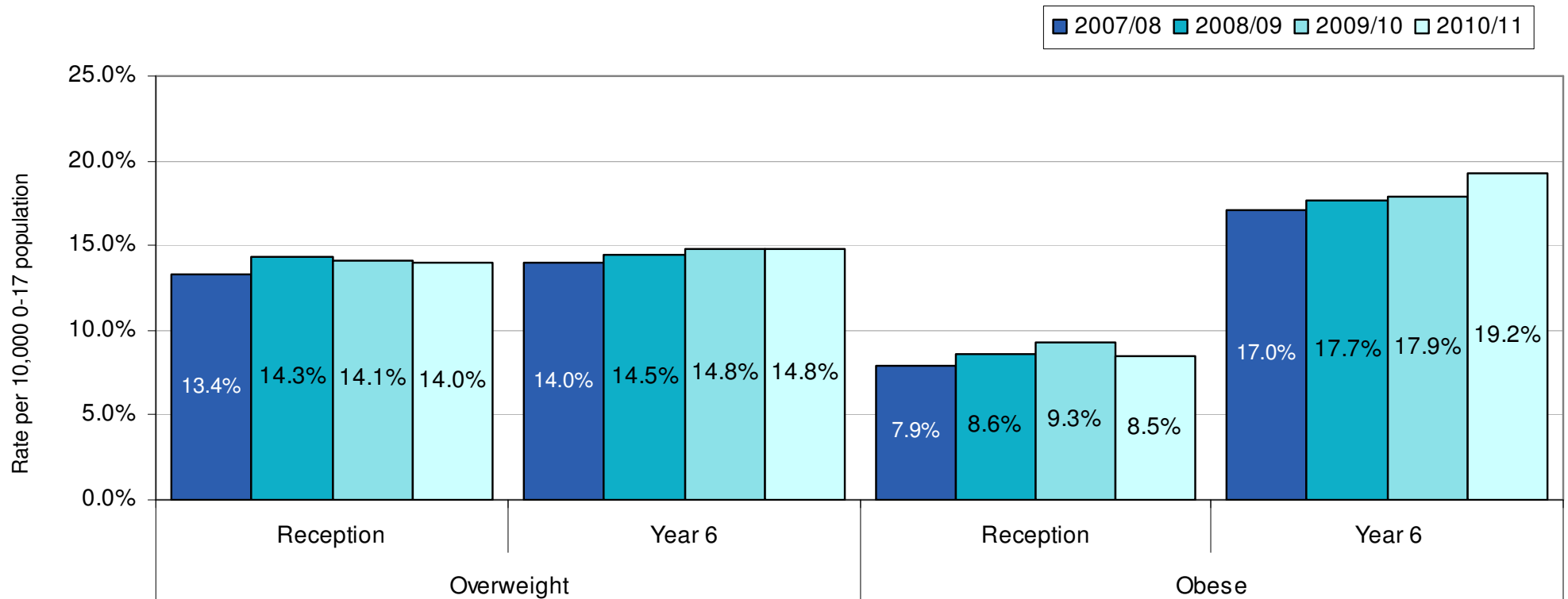
## Under 18s Conception Rates

- Year 6 school children have seen an increase in both overweight and obese numbers over the four academic years. The largest increase has been in obese children of 2.1 percentage points

- There is a marked difference between Obese levels between Reception and Year 6

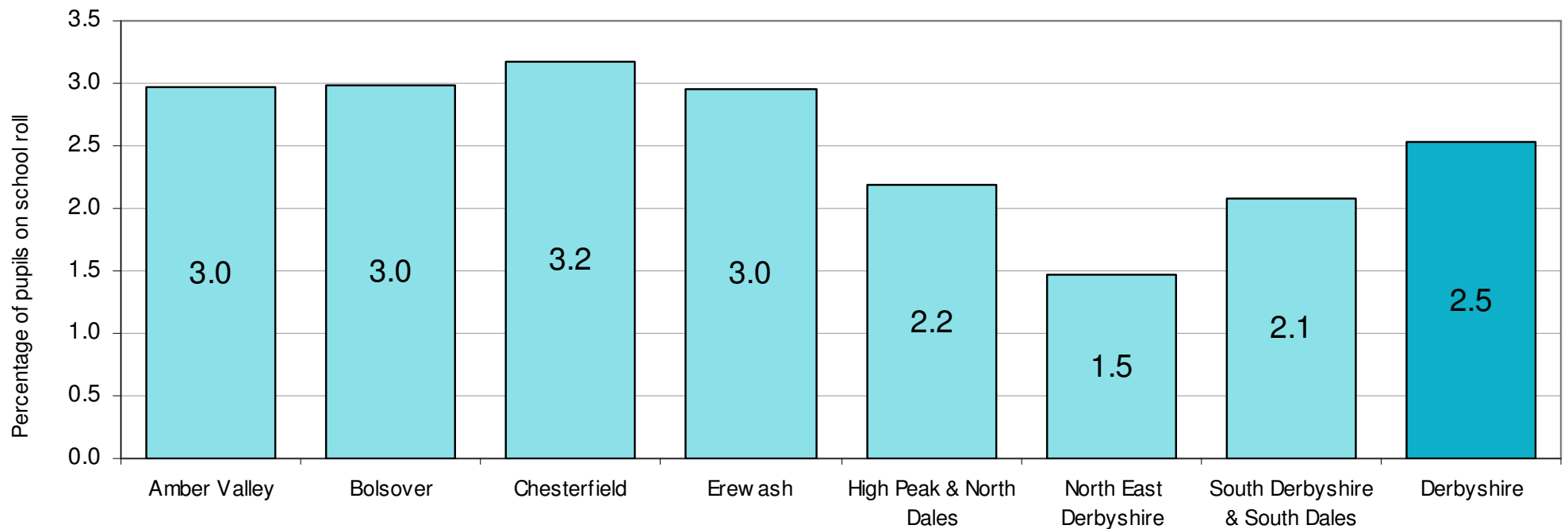
- Reception year pupils have seen a decrease in both Overweight and Obesity levels since 2009/10

- North East Derbyshire has the lowest percentage of pupils with a statement of Special Educational Need (SEN) at 1.5%

- Chesterfield with 3.2% of pupils on the school roll has the highest proportion of pupils with a statement, however, this is closely followed by Amber Valley, Bolsover and Erewash with 3.0% of pupils

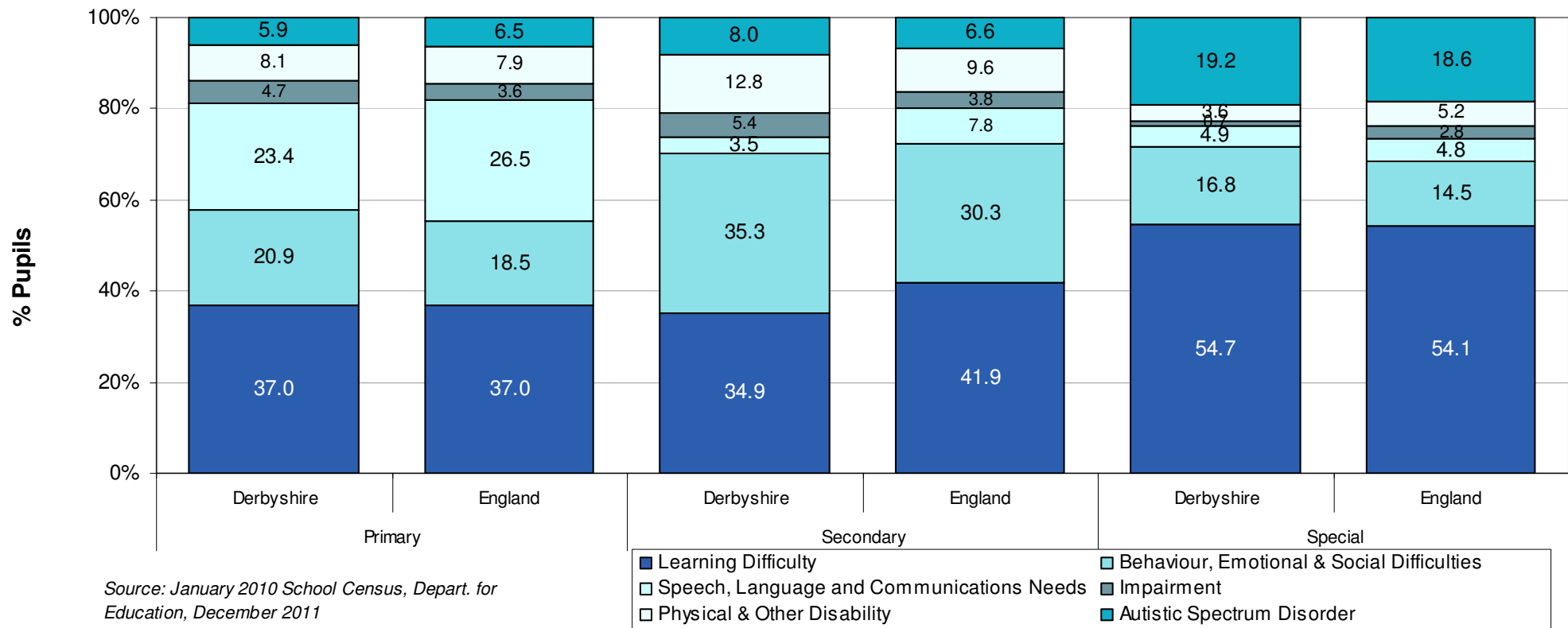

- Learning difficulties (37.0%), followed by speech and language needs (23.4%) are the main type of need in Primary school pupils in Derbyshire were issued with a statement of SEN

- Behaviour, emotional & social difficulties (35.3%) and learning difficulties are the main type of need in Secondary school pupils in Derbyshire

- Learning difficulties (54.7%) and Autism (19.2%) are the main type of need in Special schools in Derbyshire in 2010

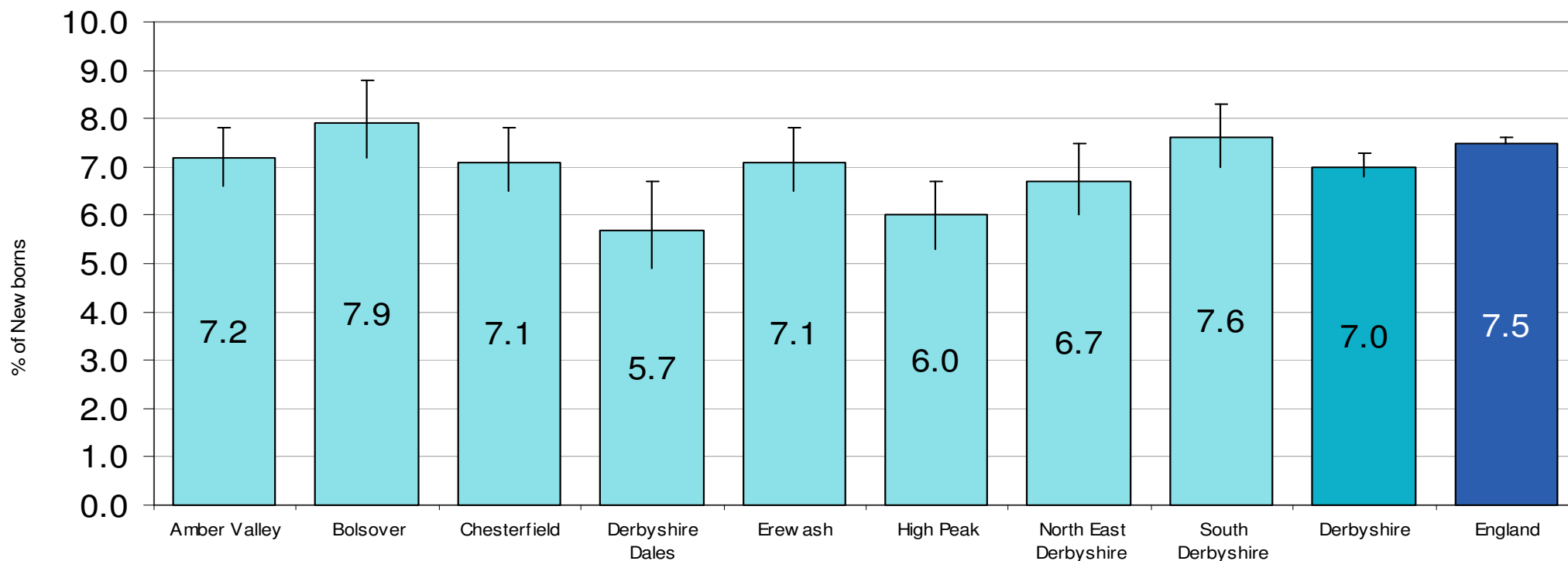
- Derbyshire (7.0%) has a lower than average rate of babies born with a low birth weight compared to England (7.5%)

- Derbyshire Dales (5.7%) has the lowest rate of babies with a low birth weight

- Bolsover (7.0%) and South Derbyshire (7.6%) both have a higher rate of babies born with a low birth weight than England (7.5%)

## Low Birth Weight births

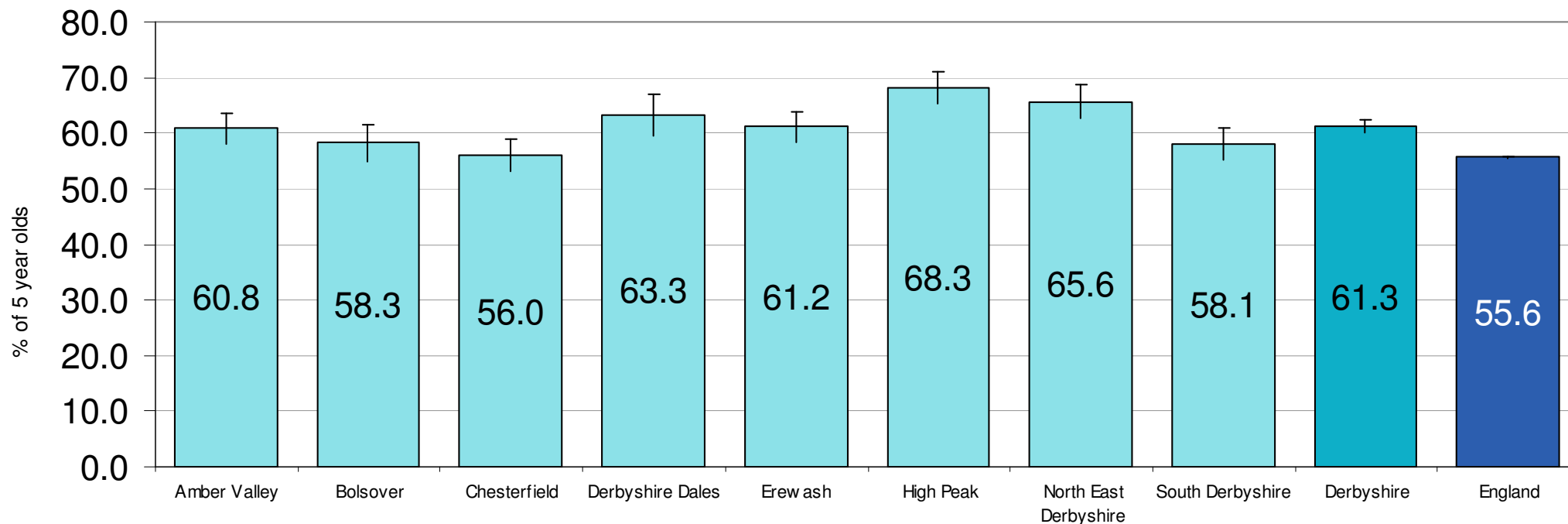
2006 to 2010 inclusive

- The percentage of children at age 5 achieving a good level of development, is significantly higher in Derbyshire compared to England (55.6%)

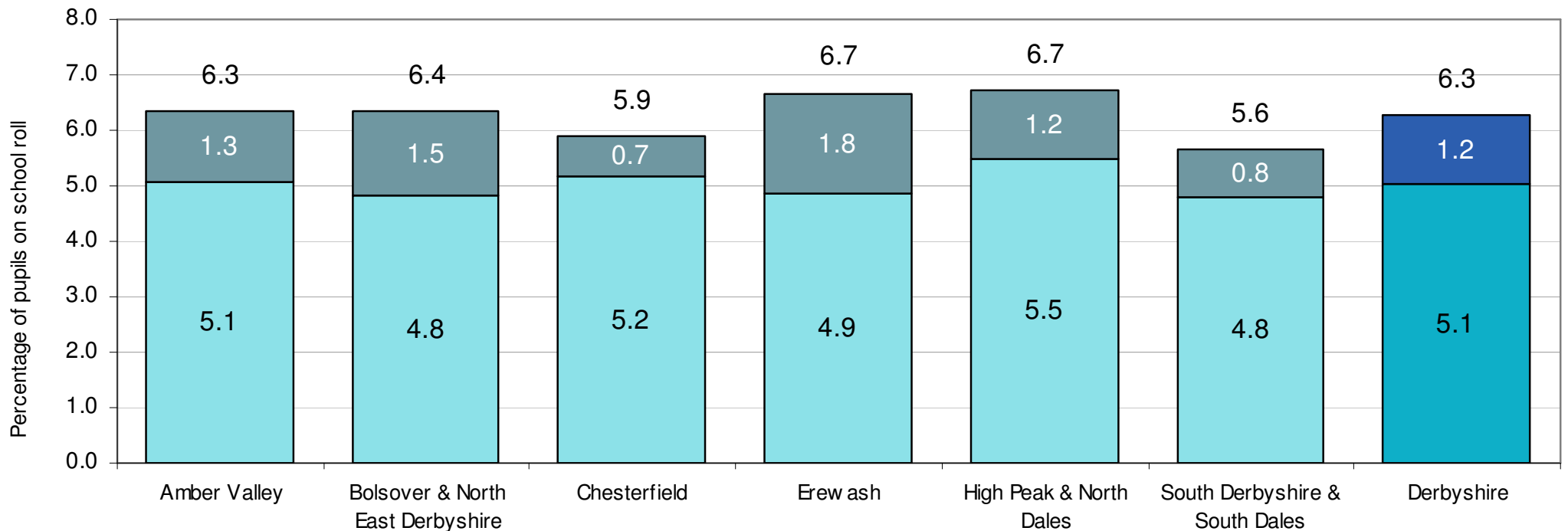
- High Peak (68.3%) and North East Derbyshire (65.6%) have the highest level of children achieving a good level of development

- Whilst Chesterfield (56.0%), South Derbyshire (58.1%) and Bolsover (58.3%) have the lowest levels across the county, all are above the England average of 55.6%

- High Peak & North Dales (5.5%) and Chesterfield (5.2%) have above average levels of authorised absence in Secondary schools across the county

- Of all Derbyshire's CAYA Areas Erewash (1.8) has the highest level of unauthorised absences in Secondary schools, followed by Bolsover & North East Derbyshire (1.5%)

### 2010-2011 Unauthorised and Authorised Absences in Secondary Schools by CAYA Area



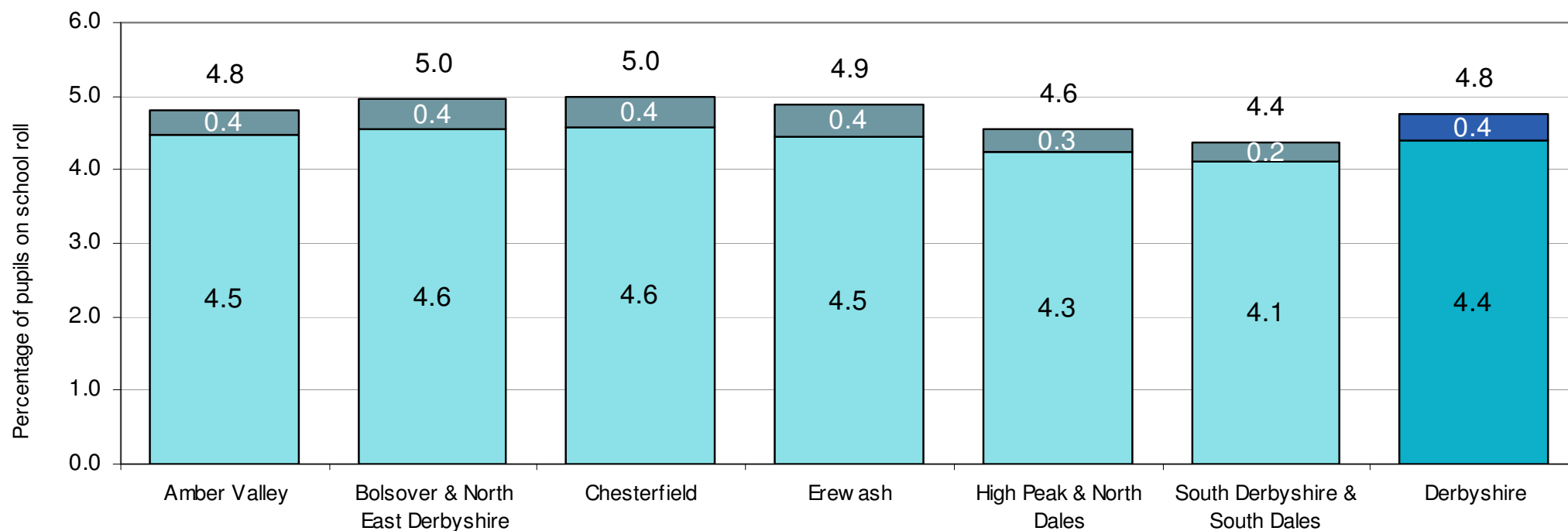

- Chesterfield (4.6%) and Bolsover (4.6%) have slightly above average levels of authorised absence in Primary schools across the county

- Across the majority of Derbyshire's CAYA Areas unauthorised absences in Primary schools stands at just 0.4% of pupils

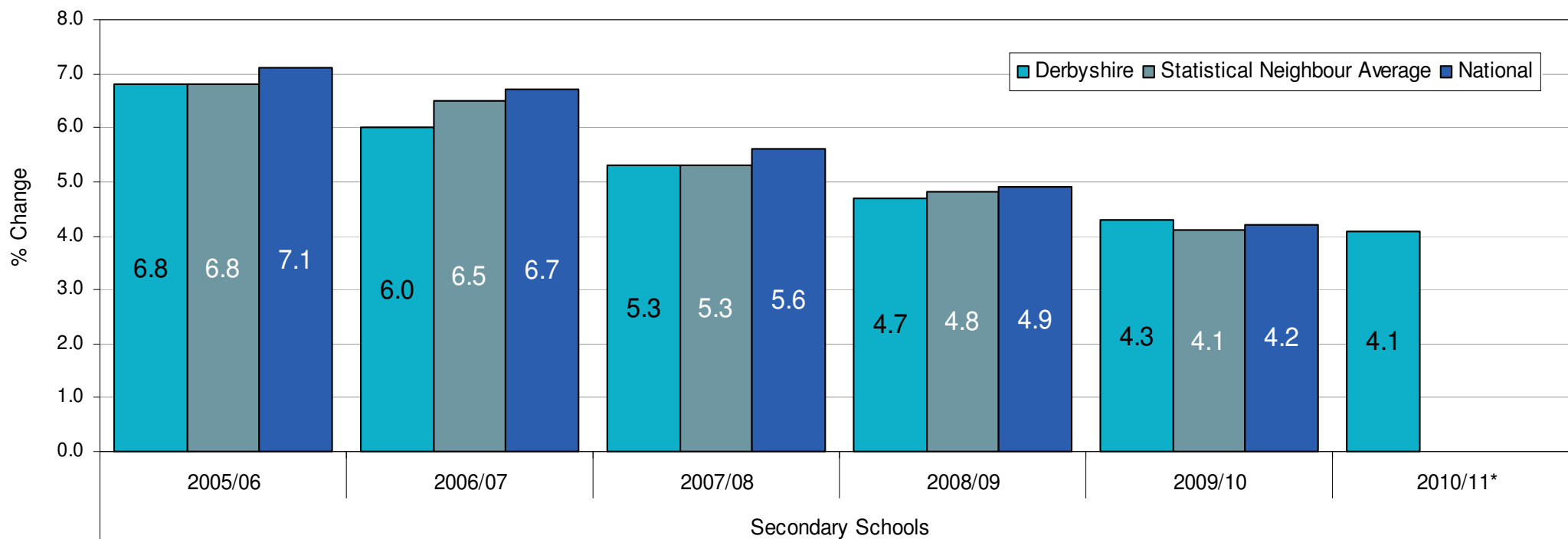

- In 2009/10 the level of persistent absences in Secondary schools across Derbyshire was slightly higher than the England average and Derbyshire's statistical neighbours

- Persistent absences in Derbyshire's Secondary schools have steadily declined since 2005/06 in both the county and across England

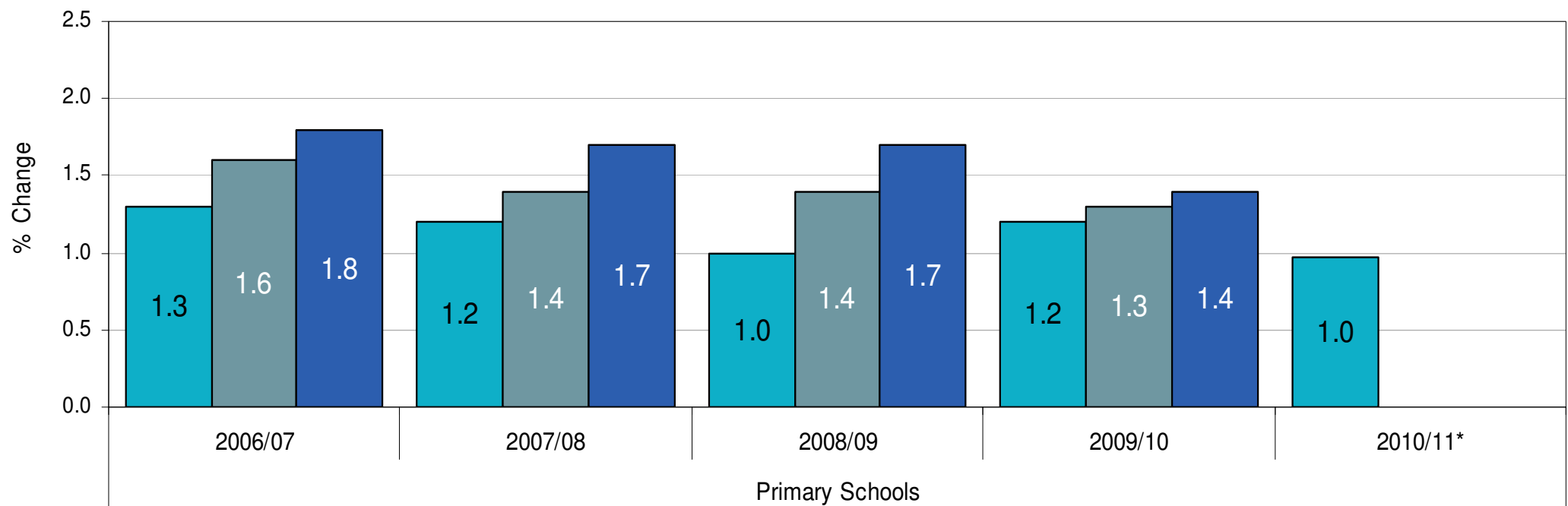

- In 2009/10 the level of persistent absences in primary schools across Derbyshire (1.2%) was lower than the England average (1.4%) and Derbyshire's statistical neighbours (1.3%)

- Persistent absences in Primary schools in Derbyshire have been fairly stable since 2005/06

Pupils absent for more than 20% of the time (63+ pupil sessions)



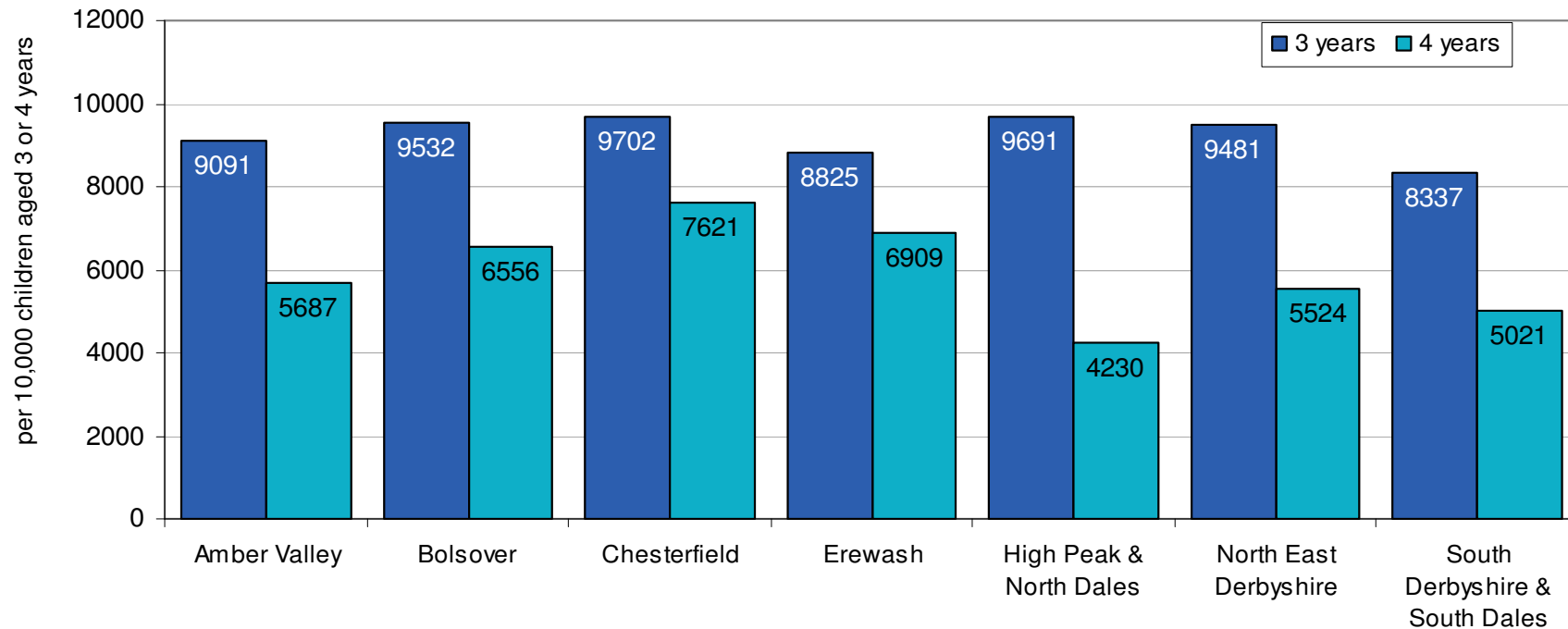

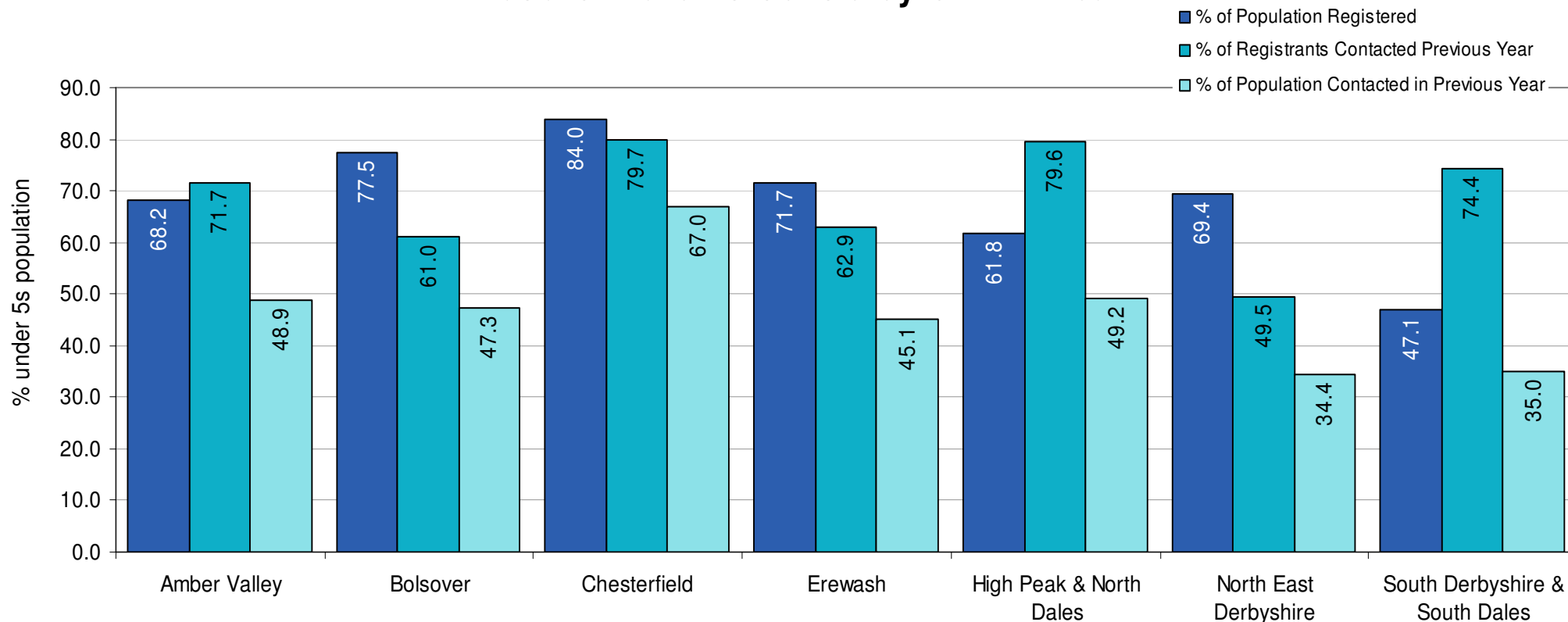
- The take up of nursery education funding for children at age 3 varies across the county, Chesterfield has the highest level of take up and High Peak & North Dales the lowest

- At age 4, Chesterfield closely followed by High Peak & Dales has the highest level of funding take up whilst South Derbyshire & South Dales has the lowest

- Chesterfield (84.0%) has the highest percentage of children under 5 registered at a Children's Centre, South Derbyshire & South Dales (47.1%) the lowest

- The highest levels of participation by children registered at a Children's Centre over the previous year are in Chesterfield (79.7%) and High Peak & North Dales (79.6%)
