


Priority 5: Older people

Improve health and wellbeing of older people and promote independence into old age

Focus on strengthening integrated working between health and social care providers and housing-related support services

□ Male 2035


□ Female 2035

- The current 75s and over population for 2010 is estimated to be 65,500 (67.9% of which are female)

- By 2035, the 75s and over population is projected to have increased by 98.8% to 130,200 (81.6% of which are projected to be female)

- The largest percentage increase is projected in males aged 90+ by 422.7% equating to 7,600 males, whereas females are projected to increase by 8,800 (191.3%) for same age group

- By 2035, Derbyshire is expected to have a substantially older population profile than the England Average

- 29.3% of Derbyshire's population is projected to be aged 75 or over, compared to the national average of 24.1%


- The largest percentage difference among older people is in the males aged 65 to 69 bracket, which in Derbyshire will represent an extra 1.2 percentage points of the population

- The older persons population will continue to grow in an unprecedented way over the next 25 years.

- All of the older persons age groups will grow year-on-year, but particularly the 75-79 year olds and the 80-84 year olds.

- There will be 17,500 more 75-79 year olds by 2025 than there were in 2010; and a similar increase in 80-84 year olds between 2010 and 2031

Projected Population of Older People in 5-year age bands from 2010 to 2035 ages 75 to 90+





There will be 8,600 people in Derbyshire aged 85 and over who will injure themselves following a fall during 2012


That number will rise by about 10% between 2012 and 2015 to 9,417 people aged 85 and over

It is projected that in each year approximately 43% of people aged 85 and have a fall.

Derbyshire has over 25,000 people aged 65 and over with “High”/ “Very High” needs
