### Operation Relentless 2010

'Operation Relentless - Safe and Confident' is a six week initiative to improve communities, make people safer and increase confidence in the police service and partner agencies by reducing crime and the effects of crime. More than 100 organisations, such as local councils and the fire service are involved.

Last year's successful campaign saw 384 fewer offences and 700 less incidents of anti social behaviour when compared to the same six week period in 2008/09.

This year's campaign runs from 27 September until 7 November and will have a different theme each week with a range of projects and activities taking place.

To date, more than 2,000 events have been planned county-wide, including community clean-ups, crime prevention events, under-age drinking patrols, burglary reduction campaigns, sports sessions for youngsters and fire safety checks. Operation Relentless contributes to achieving partnership priorities around community safety including reducing crime and the fear of crime, reducing the harm caused by drugs and alcohol, tackling anti-social behaviour, and improving the safety of local people.

### Safer Families

North Derbyshire families, with children under five, will now be even safer thanks to a scheme rolled out by Derbyshire Fire & Rescue Service Community Safety Officers.

The scheme provides enhanced fire safety training for Children's Centre Workers and teaches them how to identify and resolve potential fire risks in the home. They can then signpost families to the Home Fire Safety Check scheme.



Community Safety Officer Victoria Sparkes, who developed and rolled out the initiative, said: "Statistically, families with children are more likely to have a house fire than those without, so we have to do everything we can to inform them of what makes us all safer."

We have conducted training sessions for over 50 workers during the past six months and have experienced an increase in Home Fire Safety Check referrals through Children's Centres."

#### **Active Communities**

Derbyshire villages are being encouraged to host regular sporting and physical activity through a recently established project, the Derbyshire Village Games.

### Health and well-being zones in Derbyshire

Access to information on how to stay healthy and improve well-being is the focus of a new partnership project. NHS Derbyshire County, the County Council's Adult Care and Cultural and Community Services Department and Citizens Advice Bureaux in Derbyshire are developing Health and Wellbeing Zones across the county which will act as 'first stop shops' for information.

The Zones are currently being piloted in Shirebrook and Eckington Library and further Health and Well-being Zones are being developed at the Community Care Centre in Staveley, the new St. Oswald's Hospital in Ashbourne and Chesterfield Library. The idea is to roll out Health and Wellbeing Zones in more libraries, all GP practices, District and Borough Council venues, and possibly even have them within supermarkets and pharmacies over the next few years.



Health Trainers and Community Health Champions will support the Zones, keep information up to date and signpost users to resources or local opportunities to help them stay healthy. Health Champions may be staff employed within the venue hosting the Zone or could be community volunteers interested in health improvement within their local area.

### Alcohol scheme offers an alternative

A new course is being offered to people who are arrested for either being drunk and disorderly or for an alcohol related public order offence. It is delivered by Druglink and funded by Derbyshire Constabulary, Derbyshire County Council and Derby City Council.

Course attendees are encouraged to reduce their alcohol intake and assess the impact of drink on themselves and those around them. This includes the medical effects of alcohol and how it contributes to anti-social behaviour and violent crime. It is hoped that this will help reduce alcohol-related crime in Derbyshire.

Bolsover section Inspector Graham Lamin said: "This scheme is about engaging with a hard to reach group of people through education. We hope to affect the long term behaviour by highlighting the potential risks and consequences of excessive alcohol consumption."

So far, 40 people have attended the course, with a further seven booked onto the next one. The take-up rate in Derbyshire is 25 per cent which is better than in other areas of the country, where only 17 per cent of those offered the course sign up.

The course forms an important part of community safety work to reduce alcohol-related crime and reaches those who do not benefit from work done in schools, by the youth service and in parent and community groups.

### 'Fatal Four' causes targeted in safety campaign

Mobile phone use, drink driving, speeding and failure to use a seat belt are the 'fatal four' causes of serious accidents being tackled by a new road safety campaign. Derbyshire County Council, the Highways Agency and four neighbouring authorities are running the campaign which could become the model for others in the country.

The police are providing face to face advice on known accident black spots whilst radio advertising and roadside posters will target roads with particularly poor safety records. The success of the campaign will be measured by comparing attitudes to safe driving, as well as by any drop in collisions or speeding.

Cllr Chris Jackson, Derbyshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Highways and Transport, said: "The number of people killed or seriously injured on Derbyshire's roads fell from 633 in 1999 to 449 in 2009 - but one

crash is still one too many. That's why we're working with other organisations and the public to tackle the four main causes of deaths and serious injuries on the region's roads."



### **Chesterfield Festival of World Cultures**



Supported by the Bringing People Together Fund, the Eastern European Migrant Advice Committee held a world cultures event in Chesterfield in mid August which celebrated the diversity of the different cultures in Chesterfield and its surrounding areas.
